## **EXECUTIVE ADDRESS**

The 2019-2020 year was an incredible year of celebration, transition, focus and collaboration. While the year can be described accurately as a transition year, a word that better describes the experiences is transformative.

After months of time spent planning, organizing and creating a space to be successful, the agency was prepared to put the plan into action and on April 1, 2019, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Ingersoll, Tillsonburg and Area and Big Brothers Big Sisters of Woodstock & District transformed into Big Brothers Big Sisters of Oxford County. Throughout the planning and implementation process, the number one priority of all staff and board members was to make the transition for mentors, young people and their families as seamless as possible. Leadership and staff worked together to incorporate best practices and evaluate programs, events and fund development strategies to continue to build a strong Oxford County agency.

It was decided in the beginning that we would commit to running all annual events previously run by the separate agencies. While we were aware that this was going to be a tremendous commitment, we felt it was important to be able to evaluate and strategize effectively for our direction in years to come. Our community partners, sponsors and funders were incredibly supportive of not only this endeavour but also our programs.

Through a very fitting coincidence Big Brothers Big Sisters of Canada introduced a new Theory of Change and branding update at the 2019 National Convention. What an incredible time to have transformed into Big Brothers Big Sisters of Oxford County! Not only did we have the opportunity to refresh our look, but the Theory of Change, with its new Mission and Vision provided us with a clear roadmap to focus our work.

Near the end of 2019, agency staff and board were planning and developing a strategic direction for 2020. We were excited for the work that lay ahead and looking forward supporting our community more intentionally. What we didn't expect was our fiscal year to end with staff working remotely and unsure what the remainder of 2020 would look like.

The staff quickly realized that we were one of the few youth-serving organizations that could continue to operate because our matches can connect in many ways. We worked to transform relationships that were traditionally in person to virtual connections. The agency is prepared to continue offering virtual alternatives for as long as necessary to respond to deepening needs and growing demand for mentorship in our community.

While what the future will bring is uncertain for everyone, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Oxford County remains committed to providing support to young people across our communities. We are ready to pivot our focus as necessary and we feel optimistic that we will continue to provide strong Developmental Relationships for our children and youth.







# Treasurer's Report

In 2019 Big Brothers Big Sisters merged across Oxford County. This merger saw not only the increase in an annual budget but a change to the agency's fiscal year. Due to the merge and at the recommendation of our auditors, the agency used the "Pooling of Interest" method of accounting for ease of reading our audited financial statements. The comparative year of 2019 is a period of only 3 months, due to moving from a fiscal year that follows the calendar year to a April - March fiscal year. There is a one time qualification on the audited statement because Big Brothers Big Sisters of Ingersoll Tillsonburg & Area's audit was completed by a different firm.

## MATCH HIGHLIGHT

Brittany and Miya celebrated their one year matchiversary in the midst of the pandemic in April. They have been creative in finding new ways to stay connected during social distancing and are continuing their match for the coming year. Brittany expressed that "meeting virtually has forced us to get more creative with planning our activities, which has turned out to be a lot of fun. We have done virtual paint nights, online games and scavenger hunts. We keep a running document of things to do during social distancing and then afterwards when we can meet in person. My Little has been able to share more of her world and teach me things too, like Tik Tok and Minecraft". Despite the challenges related to Covid, it has not impacted the strong connection between Brittany and Miya. Brittany shared that "Miya has become like my actual little sister who I care about and look out for. I genuinely enjoy spending time with her. Miya has become part of my life and family". Over the summer, Brittany and Miya were able to meet for socially distanced outdoor visits. They have walked Brittany's dog, gone to the park, got ice cream and had a socially distanced picnic. They had a goal this year to make tie dye shirts, which they were able to do outdoors this summer. "Miya was so happy to do that together". When reflecting on the match, Brittany shared that "I really enjoy having Miya's energy and spirit in my life. She asks great questions and we have awesome conversations together. I love how curious she is and that she's not afraid to ask me anything. I do my best to be open and honest with her. It means a lot to me that she trusts me and opens up to me". Brittany expressed that it was important to her to continue to support Miya during Covid. "I enjoy watching her grow and hearing how her life, interests and relationships change as she grows. I also love just talking to her and laughing with her ". Miya has expressed how much it means to her to have someone to talk to, trust and confide in. Having weekly virtual outings kept Miya engaged during isolation and gave her something positive to look forward to. Miya's mom expressed that she has noticed many positive changes in Miya since her match began. "Brittany is great and I trust her with Miya. She is a great role model and is really good at planning activities based on Miya's interests. Miya loves spending time with her". Brittany and Miya have shown a lot of creativity in how to stay connected and continue to build a relationship during challenging times.
