EXECUTIVE ADDRESS

"Your efforts have insured that Brothers Big Sisters will continue to be well positioned to play a transformative role for Oxford County children and youth by igniting their potential and empowering their success through mentorship."

Reflecting back on the last year, we couldn't have predicted how different the world, our work and our communities would look and operate.

The severity of the pandemic and its impact on our community and families was just being recognized as we entered our 2020-201 fiscal year. The global pandemic amplified the critical need for our mentoring programs, increasing the necessity to stay connected and to continue reaching children and families vulnerable. particularly Reaching and connecting our mentees and mentors, at a time when social interactions were restricted, became exercise of creativity, planning dedication by the BBBS team and Board of Directors. Regardless of the method of match connections, the agency was committed to providing young people support at time when they needed it most.

To say the staff deserves the credit for working endless hours to ensure that the pandemic did not interrupt the delivery of our programs, is an understatement. Not only were they faced with young people needing more support than ever, they found themselves providing additional support to caregivers and mentors who were also trying to navigate the new reality.

Our mentors also deserve recognition, as they stepped up to the challenge and realized that connecting to young people was more important now than it had ever been. We were able to increase one on one connections with mentors by 43% due to the commitment of current and new mentors.

As focused as the service delivery team were to keep kids connected, our resource development team and Board of Directors got to work to ensure our financial sustainability. The agency was facing the prospect of a significant decrease in revenue that supports our programs, and had to get creative with how we were going to endure the unprecedented changes. Through close budget monitoring, grant writing and new, creative fundraising ideas, the agency was able to continue without the requirement of cutting any programs.

Donors, mentors, volunteers and staff doubled down in response to our situation and we are so very thankful for each and every one of you. Your efforts have insured that Brothers Big Sisters will continue to be well positioned to play a transformative role for Oxford County children and youth by igniting their potential and empowering their success through mentorship.



TREASURER'S REPORT

The community came together to support agency's programs by increasing donations by over 20% from the previous year.

Our 2020-2021 Fiscal year was full of many unforeseen challenges presented by the COVID-19 Pandemic. Overall the agency did well controlling expenses to revenue during the year, ending with a surplus of just over \$51,000 when the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy is removed. The community came together to support agency's programs by increasing donations by over 20% from the previous year. Staff did a great job supporting young people and their families considering the obstacles they faced with the pandemic and government mandated restrictions, and continued reduction in expenses. While the outlook for the 2021-2022 fiscal year in unknown, the agency was able to ensure that there are extra funds on hand to cover our expenses if revenue falls below what we are anticipating.
